Parking is free to presenters. Please follow these directions:

- 1. Park in the 17th and R streets garage, just a few blocks east of the Nebraska Union, 1400 R St.
- 2. Take a ticket from the machine when you enter and *keep it in a safe place*. You will need it to exit.
- 3. Park on one of the top two parking levels. Elevators will take you to street level.
- 4. When you check in at the registration table in the Nebraska Union, we will give you a validation ticket. *Keep that in a safe place*.
- 5. To exit the garage after the convention, insert into the machine the ticket you took when you entered. *Then* insert the validation ticket. Exit when the gate arm rises.





Nebraska Union Technical instructions for computer/projection equipment

Technical assistance: 402-472-8056

The fewest technical glitches occur when speakers bring in presentations on a flash drive, according to Nebraska Union staff. The second most glitch-free option is accessing presentations online from platforms such as Box, Dropbox or Google Drive.

For those of you who prefer to connect with your personal laptop, VGA and HDMI cords will be available. Mac users will need to bring the additional adapter cord.

The controls for the computer/projector are on a touch panel on the wall near the projection screen or on the top of the audiovisual cabinet. The USB can be plugged into the wall below the touch panel on the wall or one the side of the audiovisual cabinet. They system comes with a wireless keyboard and mouse.

If you need help with the Union equipment, the quickest option is to call **402-472-8056** and ask for the technical support person on duty to come to your assigned room.

You can also call Michelle Hassler, executive director of the NHSPA, at 402-580-5816 or come to the NHSPA registration desk (Fischer Lounge) to ask someone there for assistance. Staff at the Welcome Desk on the first floor of the Union also can provide assistance.

Please scroll down to see additional instructions for using the audio/visual equipment. Note that the setup is slightly different in the Gaughan rooms, which are Ubuntu 202 and Unity 212.

Once you have pushed the "on" button it will turn green. It will take a few minutes for the projector to warm up and project onto the screen. If you are using the Unions' computer then the "Windows" button should have a green square around it. If you need to change to VGA or HDMI, please wait until the projector has turned on then put the VGA or HDMI button. The green square should be around the button you have touched.




Below the touch panel if on wall or on side of AV box you will see the ports for the USB drive, VGA & HDMI. We should already have the VGA & HDMI cables connected.



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Below is the AV panel in the Gaughan Center. It is located right below the projection screen. When you arrive the Projector Off button will be red. Push the Projector on button and the projector will turn on and again please give it a few minutes to warm up and begin projecting. This is the setup in Ubuntu/Room 202 and Unity/Room 212.



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Below are the Gaughan USB, HDMI & VGA ports. The HDMI & VGA cables should already be connected. These ports are located to the side of the screen near the podium. This is the set-up in Ubuntu/Room 202 and Unity/Room 212.
